Trinity Book Club

The Trinity Book Club has been meeting once a month to discuss one chosen book. Last month, we read *Demon Copperhead*, a Pulitzer Prize-winning novel by <u>Barbara Kingsolver</u> that re-imagines Charles Dickens's <u>David Copperfield</u> in modern-day <u>southern Appalachia</u>, following the life of <u>Damon Fields</u> as he navigates the opioid crisis, foster care, poverty, and addiction. The story explored themes of survival, social injustice, and the resilience of the human spirit, offering a powerful and hopeful portrayal of a region often stereotyped.

This month, we are reading *The Snow Child, a novel by Eowyn Ivey* about a childless, middle-aged couple, Jack and Mabel, who are struggling with isolation and their grief over a past miscarriage. During a moment of levity during the first snowfall, they build a

snow figure of a child. The next day, the snow child is gone, but they see glimpses of a wild, blonde-haired girl, Faina, who seems to be a child of the forest, sometimes accompanied by a red fox. As Jack and Mabel come to love and care for Faina as their own daughter, they must grapple with the mystery of who she is and the question of whether she is a miracle or a figment of their lonely imaginations.

When my husband was in his late 80s, we decided it was time to downsize and enter a retirement home. Our first choice didn't work out so well and that's when we moved to Redwood Terraces in Escondido. Sadly, Kent passed away soon thereafter. Following his death, I have continued to enjoy the exercises classes, music, and a few other activities at Redwood.

When we moved to Redwood, Trinity became our church. The people were very friendly which made the transition easy. Initially, I was involved with Toy Makers and loved it very much. It was very enjoyable working with friends on projects that meant so much. I also attended the weekly Bible study.

Now, at age 91, I don't drive anymore so am unable to participate in things. Fortunately, Redwood offers transportation on Sundays, so I am still able to attend church, which I continue to enjoy.
